New System Brings Joy and Greater Safety

Have you ever had to figure out how to get out of bed? How about getting to the bathroom? These are just a couple of the questions some people with disabilities have to consider every day.

The residents of our Danby Road IRA in Ithaca need assistance with everyday tasks. As they've grown older, they've needed more help getting around. To make sure they can stay in the home they love, Unity House installed a ceiling track lift system at the residence this year.

A sling slides along each track so staff can help mobility-impaired residents move about with relative ease. Tracks in the bedrooms and restrooms make it easy to lift residents into and out of wheelchairs. Another track connects a bedroom, through a hallway, to the living room.



"It's wonderful to see someone who has used a wheelchair their whole life find a new sense of independence," said Program Manager Jodi Fesetch. "Four out of the six residents here use wheelchairs. Every time we set them up in the sling, they get the biggest smiles on their faces. This is the first time in their lives they've been able to walk, and they're enjoying every second."

Unity House installed the \$27,000 ceiling track lift system because it's critical to our mission – empowering people with disabilities.

"We used to do all the lifting by hand," said Assistant Program Director Candi Saxman. "There was always the risk of the staff hurting themselves or accidentally dropping the person they were assisting. This new system will make the job so much safer and easier for our staff and the residents."

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# CEO's PERSPECTIVE

# **Direct Support Professionals deserve higher pay**

At Unity House, we have a vision: that all people are respected and lead fulfilling lives in our community. If you share that vision, we could really use your help right now.

While many people were able to work from home during the height of the COVID pandemic, our employees risked their own health to deliver critically needed services in person. They developed creative ways to provide support in spite of staffing shortages and new regulations. They picked up extra shifts. Even our office staff took training so they could help in our group homes.



To retain our amazing direct support professionals (DSPs), we increased our permanent wages last year. But even the new rates – up to \$19.50 an hour to start – aren't drawing enough people to this challenging work. More than a guarter of our positions remain vacant.

The staffing shortage forced us to temporarily close two group homes in Tompkins County last year. If nothing changes this year, we may have to close additional homes. It hurts me to even suggest that, because I know what it means: people with disabilities will lose the homes they love.

Thanks to you and the rest of our supporters, charitable donations to our nonprofit have doubled since 2019. Clearly, our community values people with disabilities and the people who support them. But what about New York State, which provides most of our funding?

After many years of flat funding for organizations like ours, the state finally passed a 5.4% cost of living adjustment in April 2022 that took many months to arrive.

This year, advocates statewide are pushing for an 8.5% increase – equal to the growth of the cost of living – in state funding for direct support organizations. If approved, it would allow us to raise wages further and fill our vacant positions. I've spoken with most local members of the state Assembly and state Senate. All have said they support more funding for DSPs. None said it would be easy.

We could use your help. Please reach out to your elected state leaders now, while the state budget is under consideration. Tell them about your values—that people with disabilities deserve to live with dignity, and that DSPs deserve adequate pay. Urge them to approve the 8.5% increase for organizations like Unity House.

Your voice can make a difference. Working together, we can build a community where all people are respected and are able to live their lives to the fullest.

# **City of Auburn - \$36,721**

Helping Unity House recover from increased costs and lost revenue associated with the COVID pandemic. Made available through the federal American Rescue Plan Act, the money will also allow Unity House to purchase UV air sanitizers for its day habilitation program in Auburn.

# **Columbian Foundation - \$5,000**

Covering the costs to repair and paint the facade of 31 Market Street, a historic downtown Auburn building that's home to Unity House's day habilitation program.

# French & Metcalf Foundations - \$20,000

Helping to renovate a bathroom at a group home in Auburn to accommodate residents in wheelchairs. Handicapped-accessible facilities are a growing need across the organization to enable aging service recipients to remain in their homes.

"The people we are meeting are exceptional," Chris said. "I love learning with them and from them. The relationships we are building will only help Unity House in the future."

Conducted by the Cayuga County Chamber of Commerce, Leadership Cayuga is designed to stimulate public-minded thinking and increases the community's base of informed, capable leaders. Each year, the program selects about 20 emerging local leaders to participate in interactive monthly sessions. The class meets with area experts and community leaders to learn about local government, economic development, nonprofits and education, among other topics. Along the way, they join a network of about 700 people who have completed the program since 1989.

"Whoever came up with this concept was brilliant," Mary said. "The program has allowed me to meet some of the most passionate, service-minded individuals that truly have a desire to see Cayuga County thrive."

As part of the program, its members are creating a plan to further revitalize the Auburn Downtown Business Improvement District.

"To be a part of tackling some of the city's biggest challenges is an honor and a privilege," Mary continued. "I'm grateful to have been selected to participate in the Leadership Cayuga program and I look forward to using this experience to benefit Unity House."





# **GIVING GROWTH**

Unity House supporters are amazing. Together, they gave more than \$165,000 to advance Unity House's mission in 2022. That's an increase of more than 50% over 2021!

Here are some fundraising highlights at year-end:

**Giving Tuesday** - This year's campaign raised \$10,597, all of which will help upgrade our group homes to accommodate the needs of our residents as they age. Generous challenge gifts from two donors inspired a record 46 Giving Tuesday gifts.

**Phonathon** - On December 12, volunteers called donors who had given in the past, but not yet in 2022. Our friends came through with donations totaling \$11,583, including a \$5,000 match from a generous anonymous friend.

**Staff Giving** - We have the most altruistic employees at Unity House! In 2022, they donated \$4,172 to support Unity House people and programs.

# Advancing our mission

Unity House is dedicated to empowering people with disabilities. Delivering on that mission in recent years has become more challenging as state funding has dropped against inflation. In response, Unity House is working to widen its base of support.

"Unity House has a powerful mission," said Chris Iven, who joined Unity House as its first Chief Advancement Officer in July. "When people know what we do and why we do it, they want to help by donating, volunteering or working here."

Marketing and Development Director Kelly Buck and Project Coordinator Alexis Liberatore have joined with Chris to form Unity House's new Mission Advancement team. In addition to all of the functions of the former Marketing and Development Department, the team is working with Unity House employees, board of directors and community members to develop new ways to engage people in support of the mission.

The team organized the Planned Giving Advisory Council, a group of volunteer estate planners who care about Unity House's mission and want to help its supporters make planned gifts. The team is also organizing a group to support and engage friends and family members of the people Unity House

serves. This summer, the team will launch Unity House's first peer-to-peer fundraiser.



# WHY I SUPPORT UNITY HOUSE

My brother Carl was a Vietnam veteran who returned from the war troubled. With voices in his head and visions of helicopters attacking, he was not able to hold a job. He began a repetitive cycle of being forced into rehabilitation, moving to halfway programs, being released and stopping his medications, followed by hospitalizations, court orders and temporary rehabilitation. This went on for years.

One beautiful day many years ago, after living there for only a month, my brother announced: "I am tired of the voices in my head. I will take my meds. I will become part of my new community." Our family continues to support organizations that provide the hope and love needed for folks to become and appreciate their own true selves. That's why, as soon as I visited Unity House, I knew I would contribute to their cause. Carl lived in Pennsylvania, but here in central New York, Unity House is where people like my brother receive the loving and transformative care needed to value themselves and enjoy life again.
